### Horticulture Defined...

"The art or practice of garden cultivation and management.

It deals with garden crops such as ornamental plants grown for their appearance; fruits, vegetables, herbs and spices grown for their food value; and medicinal plants".



#### Fresh Herbs...Home Grown!

Not ready to build a whole garden? Limited space - Need a kid-friendly summer project? Keep it simple and grow an Herb Planter. Choose a planter from home or pick one up at a local spring yard sale. Fresh herbs are flavourful for cooking, salad dressing and marinades; medicinal tinctures and scented pillow sachets.





**Pick your Pot.** Bigger is better as it holds more soil and thus retains more water. Clay pots are preferred, as they add weight to reduce the chance of wind from tipping them over. *Tip:* For best results use one pot to hold one type of Herb.

Buy fresh potting mix. When growing herbs at home that will be consumed, best to grow them organically. Use organic potting mix enriched with Micorizole (My-co-RYE-zal). *Tip:* Add some Sea Compost. Mix 4:1. Both will help your new herbs thrive, naturally Fill: Line bottom of pot with a piece of fabric to slow down the soil from washing out. No need to add rocks or any other drainage. Fill with new potting soil.

Plant: Plant your starter plant in the centre of your pot, at the same depth as you got it; gently patting down to secure. Make sure all roots are tucked in and covered with potting soil.

Water. Water daily to start, and when established, try every three days. Every container is different, so observe how yours responds. Tip: Tuck an always-filled, outdoor watering can nearby, out of full sun.

Feed. Yes, most plants need a little help to thrive. Tip: Always use

### The Night Beacon Daylily is Tay's official flower!

A magnificent reblooming Lily that appears in early-mid summer and again into the fall. These lilies dependably produce oodles of attention getting, large 4" blooms that are a deep magenta with a chartreuse eye that blends into a lime green throat. The recurved

petals and sepals add further to the Night Beacon's beauty. These butterfly-luring flowers open on long (27") stems. Lilys are hardy perennials, tolerate our hot summers, are drought tolerant when established and bloom every year. They grow faithfully in full or partial sun. Day Lillies attract butterflies, bees and hummingbirds.

The name 'Night Beacon', wonderfully honours the history of a lighthouse which offers a way-finding beacon of light to guide at night. *Tip:* After flowering, remove each flower. This will improve the overall appearance and promote reblooming. When all the flowers on a stem are deadheaded, remove the whole stem as well.
